Crystal is someone with a bizarre addiction as well. She has been eating laundry detergent since she was at the young age of 12.

"I can't stop eating a household cleaner," Crystal stated. "I like the taste. When I first started eating it, I would put some in my hand and mix it with water, and make it into a thick paste. It soon progressed to eating it dry."

Medical Mystery: Girl Who Feels No Pain

We all have the daily aches and pains, whether it's from sports or just sleeping funny and getting a neck cramp. But what if you couldn't feel pain at all?

Ten-year-old Gabby Gingras was born with the rare condition known as HSAN type-4, where her nervous system cannot react to pain, feel extreme weather, or detect change in body temperature.

"I think it would be fun for five minutes," said junior Craig Cox.

Most parents would find it a blessing knowing that their child does not feel pain, but the Gingras family has learned that it is bittersweet. Gabby has suffered many self-inflicted injuries; some even being life threatening.

When Gabby was born, parents Steven and Trish Gingras knew that something wasn't right.

"They do the K test the very next day where they poke the heel and she slept right through it," said father Steven in an interview.

They shrugged it off, thinking she was going to be a good baby and a heavy sleeper. However, this perception changed when one day Gabby chewed on her hands while teething without knowing she was hurting herself.

"She had bit down through her skin," said mother Trish Gingras. "She would have bit down to the bone had I let her. It was just chewed up. It looked mangled and nasty, like raw hamburger on her hand."

Gabby now has all of her teeth pulled to prevent damage to her mouth, hands, and tongue.

Along with her teething problems, Gabby is forced to wear protective eye wear after poking and scratching her eye out to the point of blindness.

"That's the most messed up thing I've ever heard," said junior Cody Geisler. "It would be fun for at least ten minutes."

As if these injuries weren't enough, Gabby also suffered second-degree burns on her hand after grabbing a hot light bulb as if she were holding a baseball.

These everyday struggles are something the Gingras family has learned to live with, but parents Trish and Steve always fear for her health. With the inability to feel if she has a fever, Gabby could be very sick and not even realize it.

However, the Gingras family is very thankful to have her in their lives, and will be there to take care of her through it all.

"We've met families that have lost their kids," said Trish. "So at the same time, so what if our kid is blind? So what if she ends up in a wheelchair? We can hold her. We can love her."

Gabby is your average 10 year old, with the sassy attitude towards her parents and the same daily activities, just with supervision.

"I feel normal like any other kid," said Gabby.

Gabby has starred in documentaries, and on shows like *Oprah*, *Maury*, and *Montel*. The media has helped her to connect to the few others that have her condition.

"Pain teaches," said Trish. "Pain protects. Pain can save you from a lot of bad things in life."

Although Gabby cannot learn from pain, she has a great family to support her and help her learn her restrictions to live a normal life.

Canadian rock superpower trio RUSH are coming to Cleveland on April 15. The band embarked on their extremely successful Time Machine Tour last year, during which they performed their 1980 hit album *Moving Pictures* in its entirety every night.

Between June and October of last year, the tour included stops throughout the United States, Canada, and South America. A few months after the last leg of the 2010 tour ended, it was announced that the tour would kick back up again on March 30, 2011. "due to overwhelming demand".

The Cleveland concert looks to be quite a special night. Cleveland is the city that broke RUSH into the limelight (heehee...) in their early years, giving considerable airplay to their song "Working Man", which blue collar folk and music fans alike latched onto. Gas Prices – Are They Ever Going Down?

Gas prices have skyrocketed over the past few weeks, reaching alltime high prices that have left many in rage.

According to the Lundberg Survey, with its focus on fuel gases, the United States gas prices increased approximately 33 cents within a two-week time period. That makes the prices for the gasoline market the second-biggest price jump in history.

The Lundberg Survey sampled an estimated 2,500 gas stations for their prices. Their recent survey showed the highest average price in the United States was in San Diego, with its price being \$3.87 per gallon.

The past Lundberg Survey of cities was conducted this past Friday. The survey also showed that gas prices have risen about 82 cents since September of 2010.

"This time around, the spike comes not from nature, but from people," survey publisher Trilby Lundberg stated. "The armed struggle in Libya has shocked international oil markets and here it is at the pump."

The biggest gas price jump was between August and September of 2005. There was a 38-cent spike, which was caused by the immense damage of Hurricane Katrina.

Lundberg shared that the highrising gas prices could most definitely hurt the nation's economic recovery. She said that the demand for gas has been growing at a rate of 1%.

"Higher prices today are certainly capable of halting that gasoline demand growth, which would reflect bad news in the economy," Lundberg said.

John Hofmeister, former president of Shell Oil, shared his thoughts on gas prices during an interview for *Platts Energy Week*.

"Americans will pay \$5 for a gallon of gasoline by 2012, thanks to growing global demand for oil,

tighter supplies, and inadequate responses by the United States government," Hofmeister said.

Hofmeister continued on predicting little, if any, drilling within the Gulf of Mexico for the next few years.

"If we stay on our current course, within a decade we're into energy shortages in this country big time," Hofmeister stated.

Many political policy experts, such as Douglas Holtz-Eakin, are anticipating a higher tax. There is an 18-cent per gallon federal gas levy, which has not been altered since 1993.

"We know the broad contours of some things that have to happen," Holtz-Eakin stated. "You have to price oil on a permanent basis to provide incentives to shift away from it. It's the key issue, and the hardest one to make progress on."

As gas prices are continually changing, be aware of the current prices and budget your money wisely!
