Big Night for Country Music

This fall, the 45th annual Country Music Association (CMA) Awards will hit the stage at Bridgestone Arena in Nashville on Nov. 9 at 8 p.m.

For the sixth year, five of the twelve categories were announced live on ABC News, *Good Morning America*, by Jake Owen and The Band Perry.

The other seven categories were announced by Jerrod Niemann and Thompson Square from the historic Ryman Auditorium in Nashville, the home of the first CMA Awards broadcast in 1968.

This year, Taylor Swift will battle the boys with a total of five nominations. Up against her, who also have five nominations, are Brad Paisley, Blake Shelton and Jason Aldean.

When the nominees were announced, many of the country stars were quick to respond.

"Thanks to you guys and the CMA voters; we got 5 CMA NOMINA-TIONS THIS MORNING," tweeted Swift. "I am flipping out!!!"

Swift wasn't the only artist who was quick to thank her fans; Shelton also made sure to mention his own fans.

"WOW! Five CMA nominations...now I know what it's like to be Miranda Lambert," he joked. "Thank you, guys!"

With the variety of great albums released this year, ranging from a risky, new type of "country rap" to an emotional, self-written album, the decision for Album of The Year might be a tough one.

Artists with albums nominated into the category are Swift, Paisley,

Shelton, Aldean and the Zac Brown Band.

In the category for Song of The Year, Kenny Chesney, Aldean, The Band Perry, The Zac Brown Band and Swift are the nominees.

However, in this particular category, the award actually goes to the song writer, not the actual artist.

In Swift's case, this will be her first nomination as a song writer for her very own song.

Swift will also have an opportunity to receive an additional trophy as the producer of her most recent album, *Speak Now*.

Even though there are many more categories to recognize, the main one everyone is focused on is Entertainer of The Year, which is one of the biggest awards an artist can receive in country music.

In the running for the big award this year are Keith Urban, Paisley, Shelton, Aldean...and showing some girl power amongst the group of mainly men this year is Swift.

Both Paisley and Swift are returning Entertainer of The Year winners and they've both had huge years, however that doesn't mean they're the only two who have a shot at the award. Urban, Shelton and Aldean all have been on tour this summer and recently released successful albums.

Radio stations have already hinted who they think is favored to win it this year, but in all truth ... the award could go to any one of the five talented artists.

See Captain America Before Time Runs Out?

Superhero movies grow more popular every day and Marvel Studios wants to cash in on the trend with their upcoming *Avengers* movie, which will see superheroes like Iron Man, Thor, and The Hulk team up on the big screen. But before they finished *The Avengers*, Marvel introduced their last major hero to moviegoers in *Captain America*

Captain America: The First Avenger serves as a prequel to movies like Thor and Iron Man, taking place during World War II and explaining the origins of the titular hero. It features Chris Evans as Captain America, Hugo Weaving as the Red Skull, and Dominic Cooper as Howard Stark.

The story concerns Steve Rogers, a good-natured, but frail, young man who wants to enlist in the United States army. Unfortunately, he is constantly rejected due to his poor health. However, Rogers gets his chance when he is part of a secret government project that injects him with a super solider serum. The serum gives him boosted strength and enhances his senses. After going on a rescue mission to save a group of POW's he becomes Captain America.

I have a feeling audiences would

appreciate *Captain America* much more if there weren't so many other superhero movies being released. As it stands, *Captain America* is a well put together film that simply can't compare to other superhero movies like *The Dark Knight* and *Iron Man*.

Captain America's story is fine, but predictable. There aren't too many twists and turns in it but it is serviceable. However, it doesn't have the complex thematic meaning that other superhero movies do, such as *Iron Man's* discussion of the impact of arms dealers on American militarism or *The Dark Knight's* comments on terrorism in a post-9/11 society.

The actors all give decent performances, but there aren't any ones that particularly stand out. As a character, Captain America is likable enough and easy to root for, but simply isn't as charming or complex as other superheroes, making him less interesting as a result.

Captain America doesn't have the wit and charm of Robert Downey Jr.'s Iron Man. *Batman Begins* spent an entire movie exploring the development and psychology of the title character, and for good or ill, Christian Bale's performance as Batman stuck with you. In terms of character development, Steve Rogers doesn't have a lot going on. He starts the movie as an awkward guy who tries to do the right thing to a superhero who tries to do the right thing. There aren't any profound changes in Rogers; nothing really changes about him besides his build.

On the positive side, the action is well executed and World War II is always a good setting. The first half of the film functions surprisingly well as a period piece, getting the look and feel of the World War II era down to a tee. It's also interesting to see how the history of the real world fits in the Marvel universe, successfully combining World War II, the Norse mythology of *Thor*, and the science fiction of *Iron Man*.

If nothing else, *Captain America* is a well made film, combining a competent cast with a competent script and a really well done setting. The film probably won't stick with you the way *The Dark Knight* did, but it's decent enough and worth seeing if you have nothing to do on a boring afternoon.

Captain America: The First Avenger is at the tail end of its theatrical run, so if you plan on seeing it in theaters, you may want to do that soon.
